Reflections from John S. Mogabgab

"In 1528 Lieutenant Nuñez Cabeza de Vaca and three others found themselves the sole survivors of a shipwrecked Spanish expedition to Florida. Thus began what was eventually an eight-year journey from the Gulf of Mexico to the Pacific Ocean. Subjected to tempests, starvation, and enslavement, these military adventurers were stripped of their armor, their weapons, and finally even their European way of perceiving the world. This progressive nakedness symbolized the deepening vulnerability which marked the encounters between Cabeza de Vaca's band and the native peoples of the regions through which they passed.

"It was in this condition of vulnerability that the destitute Spaniards discovered within themselves a power of healing, of granting life and health and joy to others. As they began to perceive the Indians as fellow human beings, they also found their own humanity enlarged. The haunted eyes of the suffering people who came to them for help became a gateway to a new world: 'Those eyes...they thrust me out of myself, into a world where nothing, if done for another, seems impossible.' Cabeza de Vaca was thinking of more than geography when he

concluded, 'A gulf deeper than ocean yawns between the old world and the new.' He and his comrades had entered the land of compassion.

"It is this same yawning gulf between the old world and the new that God traversed in Jesus Christ. Stripped of all divine accourrements, God entered our worn-out world in the naked vulnerability of a newborn child. Jesus never lost this vulnerability. The suffering of the people penetrated to the core of his being. The word most commonly used in the Synoptic Gospels to portray the compassion of Jesus recalls the ancient imagery of the womb of God (Isa. 49:15). It was from this deep inward place that Jesus brought forth healing and new life (Matt. 14:14, Mark 1:41, Luke 7:13; see below). Compassion expresses the inmost truth of God's nature; it is the fertile suffering of love that births a new creation.

FIRST UMC, CHATHAM, AWARDS SCHOLARSHIPS

Last, year the Church Council approved a new Community Outreach program: the sponsorship of two scholarships for graduating seniors from local high schools. Each scholarship is for \$1,000 and is to be awarded for second semester expenses the next year. We asked the schools to select the recipients based on high academic achievement as well as outstanding character and activity in extracurricular and community service activities. To date, we have not received notification of a recipient from Cape Cod Technical High School, but we are pleased to announce the recipient from Monomoy Regional High School. Daniel Street of Long Pond Drive, Harwich, is the first recipient from MRHS. He plans to pursue a career in computer engineering at UMass Amherst with the hope of using computers to create better options for impoverished nations. In addition to computers, Daniel has developed an interest in studying inexpensive geothermal energy, which would also be beneficial for underdeveloped countries. His activities in high school include varsity tennis and cross country, president of the MRHS Animal Welfare Club, and a Global Studies Service Trip to the Dominican Republic. Daniel has worked at local businesses in both Chatham and Harwich during high school and is an active member of Holy Redeemer Catholic Church, Chatham.

In addition to the two scholarships for graduating area seniors, our church has been proud to award \$500 scholarships to four other students who have a connection with our congre-gation. In January, Rhianna Jones, granddaughter of Robin Rank, was awarded a travel scholarship for her high school choir's trip to Ireland. In February, Callum Brooks, nephew of Diane Kennedy, received a second semester award to Cape Cod Community College, where he is studying I.T. Grace Haskell, a long-time member of our church family, received her award for her sophomore year studies at UMass Amherst, where she has a double major of Communication Disorders and Speech Pathology and Psychology. Our fourth recipient was Parker Firmin, Michael Firmin's son, who has just finished his sophomore year at Holy Cross, where he is majoring in Math. These additional scholarships have been made possible through the generosity of the June and Dennis Marquis Memorial Fund.

We are so very proud of all our students and are very happy that First United Methodist Church of Chatham has been able to help them achieve their goals.

BACKYARD BIRDS of MASSACHUSETTS



My niece, Sam, has had a great idea that is a lot of fun and works well to get us together, but not too close together, during the COVID-19 pandemic—bird watching!

This fun activity can be done from most homes as well as from beach parking lots. At the beach between 9—4:30, you will need a parking sticker; a pass will be needed by non-residents. Go online for more information—**chatham-ma.gov/sticker**, and you will find beach pass and resident sticker information.

Since my niece and I both drive and live in opposite directions, we choose a meeting spot and each drive there. For us it is usually Forest Beach in South Chatham, but there is also the overlook at the Lighthouse, Stage Harbor Pier, Oyster Pond, Hardings Beach, and Cockle Cove. Since Cape Cod is in the migration path for so many birds, we have great opportunities for viewing.

Remember always, that wild animals are very much affect-ed by human behavior. Plastic trash is now found frequently in birds' nests and bird necropsy (bird dissections). Picking up plastic garbage trash on the beaches and in the forests is always helpful to wildlife, but stopping use of plastic and finding alternatives to plastic enables a cleaner environment all around. Cleaner air, cleaner water, cleaner food, cleaner land, and better health.

Also, let's celebrate 100 years of women's right to vote! Stay well, and stay safe.
